State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Arizona Department of Health Services \$1,180,182

The Arizona PREP program implements eight evidence-based programs — *Be Proud! Be Responsible!*, *Be Proud! Be Responsible! Be Protected!*, *Becoming a Responsible Teen*, *iCuidate!*, *Making Proud Choices*, *Reducing the Risk*, *Promoting Health among Teens* - Comprehensive Abstinence and Safer Sex Intervention, and *Teen Outreach Program* — in schools and community-based settings. Arizona contracts with six agencies in areas with high rates of teen pregnancy and has a special focus on Hispanic, Native American, and African-American students, as well as pregnant or parenting youth, youth in foster care, and runaway or homeless youth, ages 11 to 19 years old. Arizona PREP plans to serve 5,000 youth annually in Alhambra Village, Avondale, Buckeye, Camelback East Village, Casa Grande, Central City Village, Douglas and Pirtleville, Drexel Heights, El Mirage and Youngtown, Encanto Village, Flagstaff, Glendale Central, Laveen Village, Mesa Central, Mesa West, Nogales, North Mountain Village, Rio Pico, San Luis, Somerton, South Mountain Village and Guadalupe, Surprise South, Tempe North, Tucson Central, Tucson Foothills, Tucson South, Tucson West, and Yuma. Arizona PREP incorporates the following adult preparation subjects into their programming: educational and career success, healthy life skills, financial literacy, and healthy relationships.

Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant

The State of Arizona serves 10,000 youth ages 11–19 in schools and community centers in rural and urban counties. The grantee offers several options of curricula that sub-recipients can choose from, including *Choosing the Best*, *Love Notes SRA Edition*, *Making a Difference*, *Promoting Health Among Teens (PHAT)!* *Abstinence Only*, and the *Teen Outreach Program (TOP)*. In addition to the evidence-based curriculum, programs may deliver an optional parental education component to parents of youth ages 11–19.

CAMPESINOS SIN FRONTERAS – Somerton, AZ

Campesinos Sin Fronteras (Farmworkers Without Borders) will implement the THRIVE! Initiative (THRIVE!) in San Luís, Arizona. THRIVE! will implement *Teenage Outreach Program*® curriculum with youth and the *Familias Unidas* curriculum with youth and parents/caregivers. THRIVE! will utilize a holistic approach to leverage partnerships, incorporate youth and community voice, and replicate practices that have proven effective to promote optimal health among San Luís youth aged 13-18. Multiple support services for youth, such as community service learning, a leadership institute that trains peer educators, and social media will complement the proven effective curricula. The Adolescent Wellness Network will serve as an advisory group to encourage THRIVE!'s evolution and sustainability for promoting optimal health and wellness among San Luís teens. THRIVE! aims to serve 1006 youth and 60-80 parents/caregivers annually.

Pascua Yaqui Tribe of Arizona – Tucson, AZ

\$ 1,069,440

The Pascua Yaqui Tribal Adolescent Health Project (TAHP) aims to reduce teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infection (STI) rates by: 1) implementing the Respecting the Circle of Life curriculum with tribal youth aged 12 to 19; 2) educating caregivers on issues related adolescent health; 3) providing age appropriate, medically accurate, and trauma-informed resources to youth, parents/caregivers, tribal providers, and stakeholders; and 4) building networks, partnerships, and community capacity to adapt policies and procedures to improve services for adolescents. TAHP will solidify linkages to existing resources and create resources to maximize the impact of the intervention and will utilize an Advisory Committee to ensure all activities are culturally sensitive. The project aims to reach 240 of the most at-risk adolescents in the community, 240 caretakers, 50 providers, and 50 community members annually.

Touchstone Behavioral Health – Phoenix, AZ

\$ 1,300,692

The grantee will implement the Building Community Resilience; Systems Approach to Teen Pregnancy Prevention project to address: 1) sexual health awareness/education; 2) mental health and emotional regulation; 3) healthy dating relationships; 4) family functioning and communication; and 5) other factors that increase healthy decision-making and reduce the risk of teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the Glendale and Alhambra regions of Phoenix, Arizona. To achieve these goals, the project will include direct curriculum implementation with youth and parents/caregivers using *Making Proud Choices*, *Love Notes*, *Safe Dates*, *Active Parenting of Teens*™, and *Positive Parenting Program*® curricula, professional development training for youth-serving organizations and schools, community education and resource sharing, referrals to mental health and substance abuse treatment, an annual professional conference, and social media and public service announcement campaigns. The project aims to serve 1,700 youth in year one, 5,539 youth in year two, and 5,630 youth in year three for an average of 4,293 youth per year. Additionally, the project aims to serve 200 parents/caregivers in year one and 400 parents/caregivers in years two and three.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN ARIZONA ^{iv}

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 20,859 women in Arizona in 2019.⁵
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 7,200 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 3,500 births and 2,600 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Arizona saved \$88 million in public funds in 2010 in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Arizona received for Title X increased by \$8,603. During that time, the number of patients served declined by 13,997 (28%).
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 28 clinics in Arizona received support from Title X. They included local health department clinics (13), federally qualified health centers (10), and Planned Parenthood clinics (5).
- With the new Title X rule in effect, some of Arizona’s Title X grantees have been forced to exit the program.
