 The State of Florida serves 10,000 youth ages 10–19 through schools, community-based organizations, and agencies serving youth with behavioral, societal, and educational deficiencies. Sub-recipients choose one or a combination of four different evidence-based curricula to be delivered to youth. These curricula include Making A Difference, Promoting Health Among Teens (PHAT)!, Choosing the Best, REAL Essentials, and Love Notes. Sub-recipients also provide one-hour sessions for parents/guardians to reinforce health messages.

The grantee serves 1,000 youth ages 15–19 and 300 parents/caregivers.

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The Health Education and Relationship Training Services-Middle School (HEARTS-M) Project aims to improve the optimal health of adolescents and reduce early initiation of sexual activity, teen pregnancy rates, and STI/HIV infections by providing the medically accurate and evidence-based sexual education curriculum Love Notes SRA. The HEARTS-M Project aims to serve 1,500 black adolescents ages 10-14 in six Florida counties with HIV rates higher than the national average.

**TPP Tier 1 Optimally Changing the Map for Teen Pregnancy Prevention

OIC of Broward County (OIC)	Oakland Park, FL	\$ 1,455,000
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The grantee will replicate Love Notes 3.0, a curriculum that has been proven effective through rigorous evaluation to reduce teen pregnancy and associated risk factors. OIC will target youth, as well as their families, in Broward County public middle schools and high schools with high teen birth rates, sexually transmitted infection (STI) rates, and other characteristics associated with teen pregnancy, such as high poverty and unemployment rates. In addition to Love Notes 3.0, OIC will offer needed support services or referrals to youth and parents/caregivers; positive youth development activities; parent/caregiver workshops on helping children build protective factors and strive for optimal health; and a Youth Leadership Development Initiative to provide intensive training for Youth Leadership Council members. OIC will work with key supportive service partners to help youth address risk factors and build protective factors to promote optimal health. The OIC Community Advisory Group and Youth Leadership Council will also provide stakeholder representation, oversight, and input for project implementation. The project aims to serve 3,700 youth in year one and 5,000 youth in years two and three for an annual average of 4,583 youth.

Trinity Church, Inc.	North Miami, FL	\$ 1,455,000
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The grantee and its partners will implement the PlanBe_ Teen Pregnancy Prevention Project using the proven effective Love Notes 3.0 and Reducing the Risk curricula. The project will empower youth and their caregivers with the skills needed to decrease teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and achieve optimal health through teen pregnancy and STI prevention education, events, workshops, curricula homework, email blasts, a social media campaign, support services, mental and emotional health education, and human trafficking community workshops. The project will also utilize the Trinity Community Advisory Group and Youth Leadership Council to ensure adequate stakeholder representation, oversight, and expertise of project implementation. The project aims to serve 5,350 youth and 3,750 families/caregivers annually.

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TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN FLORIDA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 104,309 women in Florida in 2019.⁵
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 38,700 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 18,800 births and 14,000 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Florida saved \$202 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Florida received for Title X decreased by \$1.9 million resulting in 111,937 fewer (49%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 157 clinics in Florida received support from Title X. They included health department clinics (138), federally qualified health centers (13), Planned Parenthood clinics (3), school-based health centers (2), and other service sites (1).
- In August 2019, the new Title X rule went into effect, forcing some of Florida’s Title X clinics to exit the program.
