The Health Care Education and Training, Inc. (HCET) Indiana Connected and Supported Teens (IN-CAST) Project will reduce teen pregnancy and STI/HIV among systems-involved youth through the replication, implementation, and evaluation of the evidence-based Power Through Choices program and supplemental services. Through evidence-based programming, training, toolkits, education for parents and caregivers, and convening of a Youth Leadership Council and Advisory Board, the project will serve 400-500 adolescents annually during the grant period across the state of Indiana, particularly foster youth and youth in detention, residential treatment, and emergency placement. The project will also serve 140 parents, guardians, and foster parents with supplemental services and resources, as well as 80 key stakeholders (e.g., judges, case managers, juvenile corrections, and foster care administrative leadership), over a grant period.

#### **Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program – Tier 1**

Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) Indianapolis, IN \$1,455,000  
ISDH will implement a multi-level, multi-faceted project that addresses all five of the essential components identified in the Adolescent Health: Think, Act, Grow® (TAG) curriculum. ISDH is committed to reducing teen pregnancy and STIs by targeting the greatest areas of need while using multiple leverage points to maximize impact on Indiana's youth. The project will implement the Botvin LifeSkills curriculum to engage youth learners, will host Parent and Teen Cafés created by Be Strong Families to enable positive connections with supportive people and engage learners and leaders, and will implement the University of Michigan's Adolescent Champion Model to provide youth with high-quality, teen-friendly healthcare. The project aims to reach 3,629 youth annually.

### **TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN INDIANA <sup>iv</sup>**

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 18,889 women in Indiana in 2019.<sup>5</sup>
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 7,400 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 3,600 births and 2,700 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Indiana saved \$51.3 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Indiana received for Title X decreased by \$723,869, resulting in 22,013 fewer (48%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 36 clinics in Indiana received support from Title X. They included federally qualified health centers (14), family planning centers (13), Planned Parenthood clinics (6), a health department clinic (1), university-based health center (1), and a school-based health center (1).
- In August 2019, the new Title X rule went into effect, forcing some of Indiana’s Title X clinics to exit the program.

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<sup>5</sup> “Title X-supported centers” are supported by a mix of funding sources (in addition to Title X funding) including Medicaid, funding from state and local governments, private grants and fundraising, reimbursement from commercial insurance, patient fees, and federal grants.
