## **FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS<sup>4</sup>**

### ***Current Grants***

#### **State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) FY2021**

Michigan Department of Health and Human Services \$1,550,634  
Michigan's PREP program serves youth ages 12 to 19 at 63 sites in high-need cities implementing the following evidence-based curricula: *Teen Outreach Program, Be Proud! Be Responsible!, Safer Choices, and Michigan Model-Healthy and Responsible Relationships*. The program serves African-American youth, youth in foster care or the juvenile justice system, and gender and sexual minority youth. Michigan PREP plans to serve 2,025 youth annually in schools and juvenile justice, clinical, and community-based settings. The adulthood preparation subjects incorporated into the program are adolescent development, parent-child communication, and healthy relationships.

#### **Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant FY 2020**

The State of Michigan serves 4,000 students ages 10–15 throughout the state in schools, community-based organizations, and in residential or foster care homes. Sub-recipients are allowed to choose one of three curricula: *REAL Essentials, Choosing the Best, or Promoting Health Among Teens (PHAT)! Abstinence Only*.

#### **Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program – Tier FY 2020 - FY 2023**

Bethany Christian Service of Michigan Grand Rapids, MI \$1,039,229  
The grantee will implement Transforming the Village: Optimal Health, Optimal Future, a holistic teen pregnancy prevention project using Love Notes 3.0 Sexual Risk Avoidance Adaptation Evidence-Based Program curriculum to improve the optimal health of adolescents and reduce teen pregnancy and STI rates. The project's goal is to form a comprehensive, integrated model that will provide seamless entry into activities for at-risk youth aged 15-17 living in the urban core of Grand Rapids, Michigan. The project aims to reach 190 youth in year one and 280 youth in years two and three for an annual average of 250 youth. Additionally, the project aims to serve 190 caregivers and 100 professionals in year one and 280 caregivers and 100 professionals in years two and three.

Teen HYPE Youth Development Program Detroit, MI \$1,402,349  
The grantee will deliver the Promise Program to empower and educate Detroit public high school youth through services and the adults in their lives. The project components will impact youth at multiple leverage points, and include the Promise Collaborative, youth/adult partnership training and technical assistance, an annual "State of Youth" policy forum, and the replication of two proven effective curricula: Project AIM and Love Notes. The project will also use community mobilization, targeted role models, and

linkages to resources and opportunities to support youth on their path to optimal health. The project aims to serve 3,000 youth annually.

## TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN MICHIGAN <sup>iv</sup>

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 47,485 women in Michigan in 2019.<sup>5</sup>
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 18,700 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 9,100 births and 6,700 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Michigan saved \$158.7 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Michigan received for Title X decreased by \$331,314, resulting in 47,873 fewer (42%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 90 clinics in Michigan received support from Title X. They included health department clinics (71) and Planned Parenthood clinics (19).
- In August 2019, the new Title X rule went into effect, forcing some of Michigan’s Title X clinics to exit the program.
