FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴ Current Grants

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) FY 2021

Oregon Health Authority Public Health Division \$611,901
Oregon's PREP program serves youth ages 15 to 19. The targeted population are that are Latino, Native American, and African-American youth, pregnant or parenting youth, youth in foster care or the juvenile justice system, and gender and sexual minority youth. The program implements iCuidate!, Family Life and Sexual Health (FLASH), and Rights, Respect, Responsibility in community- and school-based settings. Oregon PREP provides services in Deschutes County, Jackson County, Klamath County, Malheur County and Adelante Mujeres, and a culturally specific organization in Washington County. The program incorporates adulthood preparation subjects, to include: adolescent development, healthy life skills, and healthy relationships. Oregon PREP has a goal to serve 300 youth annually.

Tribal Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) FY2021

Confederated Tribes of Grande Ronde Indians Grand Ronde, OR \$350,000 Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde Community of Oregon serves approximately 150 7th and 8th grade youth annually, at Willamina Middle School. Although the program hasn't determined which curriculum to implement, *Native It's Your Game*! is being strongly considered.

Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant FY 2021

Oregon Department of Human Services \$619,756 Implemented by the Children, Adults and Families Division of the Department of Human Services, the program awards sub-grants to 17 local entities to provide in-class instruction to $6^{\rm th}$ & $7^{\rm th}$ grade students.

TPP Tier 2 Innovation and Impact Network FY 2020 - FY 2023

Multnomah County Health Department Portland, OR \$1,455,000 The grantee and its partners will expand their Adolescents and Communities Together (ACT) teen pregnancy prevention project to promote optimal health among Multnomah County adolescents through a systems-thinking, youth-driven, and equity-focused approach by replicating effective curricula, Get Real and Positive Prevention PLUS, in schools and community settings. ACT 2020 will continue to strengthen community capacity and include and elevate youth as equal partners in program planning, implementation, and evaluation. The project will focus on preventing teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) among Black/African American, Latinx, Native American, and Pacific Islander youth. ACT 2020 aims to serve 5,000 youth in year one and 15,000 youth each in year two and three for an annual average of 11,600 youth.

Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Program Grant FY 2020 – 2021

Pregnancy Alternatives Center Lebanon, OR \$445,834

The Pregnancy Alternative Center serves 2,100 youth ages 11—19 (6th—12th grade) in two rural counties: Clackamas and Linn. The grantee delivers the *REAL Essentials Starting Point* and *REAL Essentials Advance* curriculum in a variety of settings, including schools, faith-based, and youth detention settings.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program — Tier 2 (Phase 1) FY 2018 – FY 2019

Northwest Family Services – Portland, OR \$375,000

Northwest Family Services (NWFS) will deliver the Deceptions project curriculum to youth ages 12-13 in schools in Multnomah and Clackamas Counties, OR. The Deceptions curriculum, delivered in six lessons, blends elements from an evidence-based sexual risk avoidance curriculum developed by NWFS and includes a supplement focusing on preventing sex trafficking. A caring adult will be available in schools part-time to support students as part of the effort to incorporate a positive youth development aspect to the curriculum. Parent sessions and parent homework will be included to engage families.

The communities are Caldwell, ID; **Salem, OR**; South Salt Lake City, UT; Centralia, WA; East Tacoma, WA; and Mt. Vernon, WA.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN OREGON iv

- Title X-supported centers provided contraceptive care to 33,004 women in Oregon in 2019.⁵
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 13,300 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 6,500 births and 4,800 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Oregon saved \$64.3 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Oregon received for Title X decreased by \$489,000, resulting in 27,153 fewer (38%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 97 clinics in Oregon received support from Title X. They included health department clinics (63), school-based health centers (24), federally qualified health centers (6), and Planned Parenthood clinics (4).
- in August 2019, the new Title X rule went into effect, forcing Oregon's sole Title X grantee to exit the program. As a result, the state is losing 100% of its Title X funds.
