**FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS<sup>4</sup>**  
**Current Grants**

**State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)**  
**FY 2021**

Wisconsin Department of Health Services \$919,760  
Wisconsin's PREP program serves youth ages 12 to 19, including youth who are pregnant or parenting, runaway and homeless, youth in foster care or the juvenile justice system, and youth with HIV/AIDS. Implementation is being provided in Milwaukee, Green Bay, Beloit, and Racine in schools, group homes, juvenile detention centers, and community-based settings, utilizing the following curricula: *Health Improvement Program for Teens*, *Street Smart*, *Making Proud Choices*, *Be Proud! Be Responsible!*, and *Safer Choices*. Wisconsin PREP plans to serve 2,100 youth annually and to provide programming to students on the following adult preparation subjects: educational and career success, parent-child communication, healthy life skills, financial literacy, and healthy relationships.

Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council, Inc. Lac du Flambeau, WI \$433,260  
Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council's PREP program serves approximately 270 American Indian/Alaska Native youth annually. The program implements the Discovery Dating curriculum in schools, a youth center, and other settings; it targets youth ages 10 to 19, and pregnant and parenting youth under age 21.

**Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant**

The Wisconsin Department of Children and Families \$941,547  
Wisconsin is using its State Abstinence Education Grant program to collaborate with three local entities. The funding targets 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade students in school-based settings and young people ages 11–17 in community-based settings in Milwaukee County.

**TPP Tier 2 Innovation and Impact Network**

Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Milwaukee, Inc. – Milwaukee, WI \$1,141,593  
The Boys and Girls Clubs of Greater Milwaukee (BGCGM) will implement the Teen Pregnancy Prevention Program, using the proven effective curriculum Positive Prevention PLUS, to reduce teen pregnancy and address behavioral or other risk factors that contribute to teen pregnancy. The project will target high-risk youth involved in after school programs, as well as justice-involved youth and youth in alternative schools. BGCGM and its partners will also offer support services and referrals to youth and parents/caregivers, such as positive youth development activities; parent/caregiver workshops; human trafficking workshops for youth and project staff; referrals to mental health services; and training for youth-serving adults and organizations to help them become more approachable and trustworthy to youth. The project aims to reach 1,508 youth in year one and 2,011 youth in years two and three for an annual average of 1,843 youth. Additionally, the project aims to reach 377 parents/caregivers in year one and 503 parents/caregivers in years two and three.

## TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN WISCONSIN<sup>iv</sup>

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 19,088 women in Wisconsin in 2019.<sup>5</sup>
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 8,700 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 4,200 births and 3,100 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Wisconsin saved \$79.8 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Wisconsin received for Title X decreased by \$132,000, resulting in 22,031 fewer (38%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 18 clinics in Wisconsin received support from Title X. They included Planned Parenthood clinics (9), family planning health centers (8), and tribal health centers (1).
