Illinois Department of Human Services Springfield, IL \$2,012,423
Illinois' PREP program serves youth ages 10 to 19 with a focus on targeting African-American and Hispanic youth who are pregnant or parenting, in foster care, runaway or homeless, and in the juvenile justice system. The program incorporates the following adulthood preparation subjects in their project : adolescent development, educational and career success, healthy life skills, financial literacy, and healthy relationships. The program implements seven evidence-based curricula: *Rikers, Be Proud! Be Responsible!, Becoming a Responsible Teen (BART), iCuidate!, Making a Difference!, Making proud Choices!*, and *Draw the line/Respect the line*. Illinois PREP plans to serve approximately 10,000 youth annually in community-based and school settings in Alexander, Cook, Champaign, Lake, Macon, Pulaski, and Vermillion counties.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program – Tier 1

The Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) will implement the Illinois Teen Pregnancy Prevention -Changing the Map project in eleven communities to replicate effective curricula to achieve optimal health for adolescents, reduce teen pregnancy and STIs, and increase protective factors. Curricula include Love Notes, Positive Prevention Plus, and REAL Essentials Advantage. IDHS selected and established partnerships with four well-established, community-based organizations with experience in teen pregnancy prevention programming. Each project site will promote Youth Champions, Parent Champions, and Community Coalitions to apply and showcase youth, parent, and community stakeholder voices to ensure that the project is of the highest quality and fit for the communities and populations. The project aims to reach 2,500 youth annually.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN ILLINOIS ^{iv}

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 71,340 women in Illinois in 2019.⁵
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 21,000 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 10,200 births and 7,600 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Illinois saved \$145 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Illinois received for Title X decreased by \$1,690,456, resulting in 4,458 fewer (4%) patients served.
- In 2017, prior to the new Title X rule, 94 clinics in Illinois received support from Title X. They included federally qualified health centers (30), health department clinics (25), Planned Parenthood clinics (16), Aunt Martha's health centers (10), school-based health centers (6), hospitals (3), family planning health centers (2), and other service sites (2).
- In August 2019, the new Title X rule went into effect, forcing two of Illinois' Title X grantees to exit the program. As a result, the state lost 94% of its Title X funding and only eight clinics, federally qualified health centers, are receiving support from Title X.
