Oklahoma State Department of Health \$661,136
Oklahoma's PREP program serves youth ages 10 to 19 at 28 sites in school, community, and juvenile justice settings in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. Oklahoma PREP implements *Love Notes, Making a Difference, Making Proud Choices, Positive Prevention Plus, and Power through Choices*—and provides programming to students on the following adult preparation subjects: adolescent development, parent-child communication, and healthy relationships. Oklahoma PREP plans to serve 3,300 youth annually.

Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant

The Oklahoma Department of Health administers the State Abstinence Education Grant Program in collaboration with three local entities. The funded programs target elementary and middle school aged children and their parents.

The grantee reaches 3,300 youth ages 12–15 in grades 7–8. The grantee uses *Promoting Health Among Teens (PHAT)! Abstinence Only* curriculum in school settings in 46 schools in six Oklahoma Counties: Coal, Haskell, Hughes, Latimer, LeFlore, and Pittsburg.

TPP Tier 1 Optimally Changing the Map for Teen Pregnancy Prevention

Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma Durant, OK \$1,337,020
The grantee will implement the Setting Morals and Resisting Temptations (SMART) Program using the proven effective curriculum Draw the Line/Respect the Line in middle schools across five Southeast Oklahoma Counties. The SMART Program aims to affect broad change through frequent meetings with the Community Advisory Board and Youth Leadership Council throughout the grant period while serving 3,490 youth annually.

Oklahoma City County Health Department \$1,455,000
The grantee will implement Project REACH (Reproductive Education to Achieve Community Health), an innovative adolescent health improvement initiative focused on middle and high schools in three Oklahoma County metro public school districts with student populations that reflect high teen birth rates, persistent health disparities, and increased adverse childhood experiences. REACH will use the proven effective curricula Nu-Culture, Get Real, Positive Prevention PLUS, and Love Notes to address systems, equity issues, populations, geographic areas, and programs identified as priorities in the community's

comprehensive teen pregnancy prevention plan. The initiative’s efforts will be delivered through school, clinic, and community settings in seven zip codes. Additionally, more than 500 adults will be engaged in building protective factors and supports for the youth each project year. The project aims to serve 5,500 youth each year.

**TPP Tier 2 Innovation and Impact Network
FY 2020 - FY 2023**

The grantee will create and support a network of trained, connected partner organizations and individuals to develop innovative, equitable, and sustainable strategies that empower and equip caregivers to increase protective factors that promote adolescent optimal health and lead to a reduction in sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and teen pregnancy in Oklahoma County. Through the Central Oklahoma Caregiver Innovation and Impact Network, caregivers will be empowered to develop strong and healthy relationships with youth, fostering communication for generations to come. This will contribute to creating a culture where it is the norm for caregivers to have open and honest conversations about sexual health with the youth in their lives.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN OKLAHOMA iv

- Title X-supported centers provided contraceptive care to 37,645 women in Oklahoma in 2019.⁵
- Services at Title X-supported centers helped women avoid 12,800 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 6,200 births and 4,600 abortions.
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Oklahoma saved \$89.5 million in public funds in a single year.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Oklahoma received for Title X increased by \$549,952. There was a 35% decline in the number of patients served (25,708) during that time.
- In 2019, 92 clinics in Oklahoma received support from Title X. They included Oklahoma State Department of Health clinics (89) and federally qualified health centers (3).

⁵ "Title X-supported centers" are supported by a mix of funding sources (in addition to Title X funding) including Medicaid, funding from state and local governments, private grants and fundraising, reimbursement from commercial insurance, patient fees, and federal grants.
