FEDERAL TEEN PREGNANCY PREVENTION GRANTS⁴

State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

Nevada State Health Division

\$417,330

The Nevada State Health Division is implementing the state's PREP grant program. The funding supports evidence-based programming in community-based settings. It focuses on Latina and African American females in Clark and Washoe counties.

Title V State Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Grant

Nevada State Health Division

\$548,392

The Nevada State Health Division is using their State Abstinence Education Grant Program funding to collaborate with Carson City Health and Human Services. The program targets youth ages 9–12, with priority enrollment given to youth in foster care. In addition, funds are used for a statewide radio and TV campaign in partnership with the Nevada Broadcasters Association.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program — Tier 1 FY 2015 – FY 2019

Nevada Primary Care Association - Carson City, NV

Program name: *Blueliner*

The Nevada Primary Care Association (NVPCA), in partnership with Community Health Centers (CHCs) throughout Nevada, as well as the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health, works to build the capacity of the CHCs to implement evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention (TPP) programs to teens served by the CHCs and their peers. In order to reach this goal, NVPCA implements *Blueliner*, a Capacity Building Assistance (CBA) program, in two urban counties and five rural counties with some of the highest teen birth rates in Nevada (Carson City, Clark, Elko, Eureka, Lander, Nye, Washoe counties). To better address the pregnancy prevention needs of the communities served, the project builds on the clinical services of the CHCs by providing CBA to support their abilities to provide evidence-based TPP programs, first in the clinic setting and then moving into community-based programs.

Southern Nevada Health District - Las Vegas, NV

Program models: *Sexual Health and Adolescent Risk Prevention (SHARP)*; *Families Talking Together*; *Be Proud! Be Responsible!*

The grantee conducts the Southern Nevada Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Replication Project, serving Clark County, Nevada communities most in need of teen pregnancy prevention. The project will implement evidence-based TPP programs in two Clark County communities within the Cities of Las Vegas and North Las Vegas with an average teen birth rate of 63.8 per 1,000 teen girls. This project will implement evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs in juvenile detention, community-based programs, and out-of-home placement for youth in foster care.

**Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program — Tier 1
FY 2010 – FY 2014**

The Center for Health Disparities at the University of Nevada Las Vegas will target 400 African American youth ages 14-18 in Clark County to implement the *Becoming a Responsible Teen (BART)* curriculum. The youth will be recruited and served through churches and community centers. The program will provide teens with HIV/AIDS prevention information, abstinence education, and communication/negotiation skills regarding sex and contraception education. The program seeks to impact youth behaviors by delaying sexual initiation, reducing sexual activity, and increasing the use of condoms for sexually active youth.

Southern Nevada Health District - Las Vegas, NV
\$997,257

The Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) will work with a core group of agencies such as the Clark County Division of Family Services, the Nevada Division of Child and Family Services, and the Clark County Family Courts to provide education and interventions for 9,000 high risk adolescents aged 13-18 years in seven zip codes. Youth will be served in detention centers or at one of two Division of Family Services sites. SNHD will be joined by a coalition of partner agencies that serve youth residents to implement the *¡Cuidate!* curriculum for Hispanic teenagers and the *Be Proud! Be Responsible!* curriculum for African American teenagers. The initial project will serve youth in the Clark County Juvenile Detention Center, Clark County Probation, and Division of Family Services Foster Care Program. In year three, SNHD plans to expand to community-based organizations (i.e., Boys and Girls Clubs) to reach youth that reside in Clark County zip codes with high incidences of teen birth rates, HIV/STD infections and poverty, and disenfranchised youth (including immigrants, homeless and those involved with the judicial system). The goals of the program are: 1) to reduce birth rates among Clark County teenagers; 2) to reduce rates of pregnancy in teenagers in Clark County; and 3) to reduce rates of sexually transmitted illness such as Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, HIV and AIDS in teenagers.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN NEVADA

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 12,770 women in Nevada in 2014.⁵ These services helped women avoid 3,100 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 1,500 births and 1,100 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in Nevada would be 16% higher.⁶
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in Nevada saved \$20.5 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding Nevada received for Title X decreased by \$378,811 resulting in 13,135 fewer (55%) patients served.
- In 2017, 22 clinics in Nevada received support from Title X. They included state and local health department clinics (18) and federally qualified health centers (4).

⁵ “Title X-supported centers” are supported by a mix of funding sources (in addition to Title X funding) including Medicaid, funding from state and local governments, private grants and fundraising, reimbursement from commercial insurance, patient fees, and federal grants.

⁶ “Publicly-funded family planning services” refers to all public funding sources that support family planning services, including Medicaid, Title X, and other state and federal resources.
