State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP)

The New Jersey PREP state grant program is implemented by the New Jersey Department of Health with the help of seven local sub-grantees. Evidence-based programs serve youth living in the state's 30 municipalities with the highest teen birth rates.

The New Jersey Title V State Abstinence Education Grant is administered by the New Jersey Department of Health in collaboration with four local entities. The funded programs serve youth ages 10–14 living in the state's 30 municipalities with the highest teen birth rates.

Center for Supportive Schools (CSS) - Princeton, NJ

Program models: *Peer Group Connection (PGC)*

\$959,500

The Center for Supportive Schools (CSS) intends to improve school attachment and social and emotional learning skills that support educational outcomes through Peer Group Connection - High School (PGC-HS), a program designed to immerse freshmen in safe, supportive groups led by older peer leaders. To achieve this goal, PGC-HS trains select school faculty to prepare high school juniors/seniors to mentor and educate freshmen and create a positive school environment. PGC-HS begins with the assembly of a stakeholder team of administrators, as well as faculty, parents, and students, who receive the training, tools, and resources necessary to meet regularly to implement the program, troubleshoot obstacles, and ensure PGC-HS's long-term sustainability. In addition, faculty members are carefully selected by the stakeholder team to serve as faculty advisors. CSS provides the stakeholder team with tools and guidance to select faculty advisors, including assessing for criteria such as: enthusiasm for PGC-HS and a peer leadership approach; commitment to positive youth development; ability to work well and collaboratively with others; willingness to implement PGC-HS with fidelity; and willingness to utilize a facilitation model rather than didactic teaching style. The study will enroll youth in the Bronx, and Brooklyn, New York, as well as Sampson County, North Carolina.

Carnegie Mellon University - Pittsburgh, PA
Program model: *"The Choice is Yours" (TCIY)*
\$1,000,000

Carnegie Mellon University (CMU) intends to improve female adolescents' health behaviors regarding pregnancy and STIs. In order to accomplish this, CMU is implementing Making Healthy Decisions, a program composed of Your Move (an intervention program on sexual behaviors) and Eat Smart (a control program on nutrition and healthy eating habits). The target population for this implementation and evaluation is females age 14-19, at relatively high risk for sexual activity or debut, and recruited through community-based organizations that serve high-risk youth in Delaware; Central and Western New York; **Metro New Jersey**; Western Pennsylvania; and the St. Louis Region. Both programs will be delivered in a series of seven 75-minute group sessions, one per lesson plan, which are scheduled at intervals corresponding to how often the group is gathered.

Program model: *Children's Aid Society - Carerra Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program*

South Jersey Healthcare will partner with local schools and community agencies to implement the Cumberland County Partnership for Healthy Teens. The project will replicate the *Children's Aid Society - Carerra Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program* in two communities in southern New Jersey. The project will target 120 students in the 6th through 10th grades, with an emphasis on Hispanic immigrant teens. The goal of the project is to reduce the teen pregnancy rate in the communities served.

The Regional Perinatal Consortium of Monmouth and Ocean Counties - Lakewood, NJ
Program models: *Teen Outreach Program™ (TOP)* and *¡Cuidate!*

The Regional Perinatal Consortium of Monmouth and Ocean Counties (RPCMOC) serves suburban and rural youth under the age of 19 in Monmouth and Ocean Counties. RPCMOC will implement TOP with African-American youth in Neptune and Asbury Park school districts and *¡Cuidate!* with Latino youth in Lakewood. Approximately 960 youth will be served.

Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program — Tier 2

Princeton Center for Leadership Training (PCLT) - Princeton, NJ
Program model or strategy: *Teen Prevention Education Program (Teen PEP)*
\$965,522

PCLT will implement and test *Teen PEP* in 16 North Carolina high schools in rural and high-poverty communities in the counties of Columbus, Greene, Forsyth, Lenoir, and Rockingham. *Teen PEP* is a school-based comprehensive sexual health program that trains peer educators in grades 11 and 12 during the school day to deliver programs to freshman students. The intervention addresses postponing sexual involvement; preventing unintended pregnancy, HIV/AIDS, and sexually transmitted infections; and reducing the impact of alcohol and drugs on sexual decision-making. All participants are exposed to a school-wide campaign developed by the peer educators to reinforce workshop messages.

TITLE X FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES IN NEW JERSEY

- Title X–supported centers provided contraceptive care to 84,650 women in New Jersey in 2014.⁵ Those services helped women avoid 20,500 unintended pregnancies, which would have resulted in 10,000 births and 7,400 abortions.
- In the absence of publicly-funded family planning services, the number of unintended pregnancies and abortions in New Jersey would be 25% higher.⁶
- By preventing sexually transmitted diseases, cervical cancer, and unplanned pregnancies, Title X-supported centers in New Jersey saved \$232.9 million in public funds in 2010.
- From FY 2010 to FY 2017, the amount of federal funding New Jersey received for Title X decreased by \$734,384, resulting in 32,047 fewer (24%) patients served.
- In 2017, 45 clinics in New Jersey received support from Title X. They included Planned Parenthood clinics (24), federally qualified health centers (10), family planning health centers (10), and health department clinics (1).
